NEWS FROM THE PARISHES

ASHBOCKING

Our fourth annual Carols by Candlelight service was held on Sunday 22nd December. Over 70 people enjoyed a rousing service of readings and carols, led by Catherine. The service was also the first public viewing of our new altar frontals and falls which were dedicated to the memory of Mrs Freda Leggett during the service. The collection will be split between the Church (to help fund repairs) and FIND – a local Ipswich charity to help Families In Need.

The service was followed by mulled wine and mince pies which gave everyone a chance to socialise!

Over 40 people joined us for our Christmas Day service which included a Nativity for the first time, and was followed by Communion (with mulled wine and Christmas cake during the interval!).

There was quite a worry on Christmas Eve when, like a number of households, the Church lost all power. Everyone frantically pulled together to develop urgent contingency plans, however the power was fortunately restored just in time! We were able to use our two new heaters which helped keep us all warm.

There are so many people to thank for all their help over the Christmas period: the Mitchells for decorating the Church and for the mulled wine (wine provided by the Bulloughs); the Ellis' for the Christmas tree and decorating; Adine for cleaning and preparing the church on Christmas day; Stephanie Andrews-Pearce and Linda Pollard for organising the Nativity; all the families who brought children, all the readers; and to everyone who contributed mince pies, Christmas cake etc. Finally I would like to send a big thank you to Catherine for making the services so enjoyable and uplifting.

I would also like to thank Kev for repairing the floorboards at the front of the Nave and John Pollard for volunteering to return to the role of Churchwarden – we will then have two Churchwardens for the first time in a very long time!

Our first service of the New Year will be at 11:00 on Sunday 12th January – Plough Sunday. We look forward to seeing you there. We will be at the Mitchells at Ashbocking Hall Farm, Church Road, for our coffee morning on Friday February 7th from 10.30 to 11.30, all welcome. Happy New Year,

OTLEY

Christmas was well-celebrated here. 97 people (and a bat!) filled the church for the carol service, which was taken by James Hall. Sue Wilkins's choir sang beautifully, including Sue's own composition "Light of the World", which was lovely – everybody said so. The ladies handbell ringers, led by Helen, were better than ever, ringing their medley of Christmas songs. They had made a nativity crib with knitted figures, which they have presented to the church, and this was much admired.

On Christmas Eve the church was packed for the crib service, led by Catherine. It included the story of the nativity, arranged spontaneously with whoever turned up, apart from Jemima Ling who was briefed to play Mary. By the end forty-six children were taking part, with lots of shepherds and angels, the latter dancing in the aisles! Later, thirty people attended the midnight Communion, a traditional service taken by Clare and Mark.

Thank you to everybody who took part, or contributed in any way, to the Christmas arrangements – the ministry team, churchwardens, singers, bellringers, our organist Helen, the Ellis family who donated the Christmas tree, flower arrangers, makers of refreshments, etc. etc. Collections totalled £599, to be divided equally between The Children's Society and Age UK.

Earlier in the month a break in the weather had allowed the traditional carol-singing around the village, this year by Land Rover and beaters' shooting-trailer. It was a damp night and the singers

(accompanied by Helen Jay on the keyboard) did well, finishing with refreshments at the pub. They collected £316 for FIND.

There were lots of super prizes for the church Christmas Draw and £550 was raised for church funds. Thank you to everyone who bought tickets and donated prizes.

84 People attended the Christmas dinner/dance in the village hall and had a brilliant evening. £1,675 was raised for the Community Council, a fantastic result. Penny and the other organisers are now stepping down and looking for a new group to organise this event next year. Please contact Penny in the Post Office if you can help.

Otley School's Christmas Bazaar was a great success, another record-breaker, making a profit of £1,300. This will go towards the centenary garden, celebrating the school's 100 years. Also, Trinity Park has hired the School's casino equipment, raising a further £600 for the school funds.

Future dates include a quiz evening on 15th March and a progressive dinner on 21st June, Midsummers Day. The next monthly coffee-morning will be held here at Church House on Thursday, 9th January, when we shall have a bookstall raising funds for Age UK. We have masses of books at very cheap prices, so do come and choose something for those cold January days.

The next meeting of the Gardening Club will take place on 13th January when Graeme Proctor of Crown Nursery, Ufford, will be speaking about 'Hedging Plant Varieties; their care and propagation'.

Starting to think about our gardens again, and with the evenings beginning to get a bit lighter, we send all our readers very best wishes for a Happy New Year.

CONSULTATION ABOUT THE PROPOSED FEDERATION OF OTLEY AND WITNESHAM SCHOOLS

St WULFSTAN 19th January

St Wulfstan was Bishop of Worcester from 1062-95. He lived during the Norman Conquest of England and was the only Saxon bishop to remain under William the Conqueror.

Wulfstan was a caring and hard-working monk. He rebuilt the cathedral at Worcester, cared for the poor, and struggled to ease the harsh conditions imposed by the Normans on the Saxons. Unlike some priests, he baptised children of the poor without charge. It is said that he never turned away people asking for help.

Wulfstan fought the slave trade in Bristol (slave trading didn't just start with slaves from Africa but had been going on for centuries with slaves from England being sold to Ireland and North Africa).

Wulfstan died whilst washing the feet of 12 poor men during a service in the cathedral. He died as he had lived, serving God and caring for others.
