NEWS FROM THE PARISHES

ASHBOCKING

It is with sadness that I report the death of Susan Leggett Cooper, who died peacefully in the St Elizabeth Hospice on the 10th January after a fairly short illness. Our heartfelt sympathies and prayers go out to all the family at a very difficult time.

Sue was born on 7th Feb 1949, the youngest sister of five, and moved to Ashbocking at the age of five where she grew up with her siblings. She leaves her eldest sister, Linda Ellis, brother Paul and sister Jo. Sue married at 19yrs old and lived in several different places including Corner Farm, Rose Cottage at Swilland, which they built, and Little Barn at Hasketon, before returning to Ashbocking for a while and living near the church.

After separating from her husband, Sue met her partner, Ray, and eventually travelled to Spain where they built a house. She has been living between Spain and England ever since, enjoying their home in the sun and sailing. She had a varied life and loved travel, having walked to base camp in the Himalayas with a women's group, and cycled around Vietnam with Ray. She had been planning to cycle round India in 2017 and was very disappointed that this would not happen.

Sue came home last year and was due to return to Spain in October but unfortunately became ill in September. She married Ray at the end of October and was looking forward to the arrival of her grandson after Christmas, a first child for her daughter Heidi. She also has a fifteen year old granddaughter, Megan.

The funeral will take place at Ashbocking church on Tuesday the 31st January at 12:00 and everyone is welcome. The wake will be after the service at Dormers, The Green, Ashbocking. Following a private cremation the ashes will be buried in a private service the next day. Any donations are to go to the St Elizabeth Hospice please. A collection will be taken at the funeral.

In our last issue I reported on the death of Gwendoline Martindale. Her funeral will take place Mon. 30th January at Witnesham Baptist church at 12:00, followed by burial at Ashbocking. Our thoughts and prayers are with the family at this time.

Thank you to Joan Parish and everybody who arranged flowers last year and who helped out at the festivals.

So you can sit in front of a blazing fire, sniffing into a tissue and think about the patron saint of sore throats.




A COLD PUZZLE
